We must be authentic. Authentic is better than perfect. I made my share of parenting mistakes, but the one thing I tried to be, do, and constantly talk about was that our home would be characterized by openness, authenticity, and transparency. Success in the Christian life (and in all of life) depends on healthy accountable relationships. Are we who we claim to be? WYSIWYG.

Church leaders are called to be examples. Church members are called to be examples—in all of life. Some Christians have sought achievement and success but have paid the cost and lost their families. Jesus calls us to a higher standard with different values and different priorities. Scripture tells us that our first priority must be godly, biblical values lived out in healthy relationships within our families, our friendships, and the church.
