This report shares good news about the progress of the churches across Latin America, but a primary focus is to provide an update on the pandemic in Latin America, and the possibilities for future mission work.

Space does not allow me to report on all of the campaigns, baptisms, evangelism efforts, church plants, leadership changes, and other projects. In this report you will read of expanded possibilities at Interamerican Bible Institute in Peru, elder selection in Chile, and evangelistic outreach in the Dominican Republic and Peru.

MISSION WORK AND THE PANDEMIC

If we were listening, we have heard God sending his church a message during the pandemic. When we look beyond our own difficulties and restrictions, the challenges and frustrations faced by our own country, we have been impressed anew with the great need and challenge of taking the gospel to a dying world, a world lost and without hope apart from Jesus.

The pandemic shouts loud and clear, **it is time to double down on evangelistic mission work!** It is time to accelerate outreach. It is time to invest in mission work that reaches the multitudes with eternal salvation through Jesus.

The past 18 months have been quite challenging for most Latin Americans. Where life was already difficult, the pandemic has made life more difficult. Most U.S. Christians have heard little about the impact of COVID-19 in Latin American countries. In Latin America, severe illnesses and deaths have been daily realities. In addition, church meetings are prohibited, borders are closed, many are experiencing economic crises, food shortages, and social and political unrest.

Rex Morgan recently shared a report from a Latin American researcher, "The pandemic will remain in Latin America and the Caribbean for a long time. Many nations in the region are not expected to vaccinate substantial parts of their population until 2022 or 2023."

The need for the Good News of Jesus has never been greater. The need for hope has never been more acute. Possibly, the receptivity has not been higher in recent years. The pandemic has not stopped population growth. In the past year, Latin America has grown by almost 6 million people, to almost two-thirds of a billion.

Now that the pandemic has opened new tools, new methods, and new opportunities, especially with technology and media tools, it is time to seize the day. We are helping churches with outreach resources. We are facilitating the ministry and outreach of dozens of national workers. We are training Christians for evangelism and discipleship. We are supporting leadership development.

The gospel continues to sound forth, churches are being established and strengthened, growth is occurring, and the Good News is encouraging many who have struggled with isolation and scarce resources.

What can you do? Will you pray daily for outreach and evangelism in Latin America? Will you pray for your brothers and sisters in Christ who are actively reaching out with the gospel? Will you pray for those who have become discouraged? Thank you!

InterAmerican Bible Institute, Lima Peru

The number of students beginning the new academic year is stable despite the pandemic. A \$10,000 matching grant has made possible the expansion of online offerings, making it possible to reach students in remote regions and to provide training for Christians and leaders across Peru, and across the Spanish-speaking world. Your generosity helped complete the matching grant, providing \$20,000 for technology and expanded service.

ELDER INSTALLATION IN NOGALES, SANTIAGO, CHILE

The Nogales congregation in Santiago, Chile recently installed a fourth elder. Brother Luis Marte joins the three existing elders—Raul Hernandez, Pedro Sanchez, and Sebastian Solis.

This church has more than doubled since the appointment of the first elders a dozen years ago. Elders committed to shepherding the flock and empowering members have led the church forward in incredible ways. Before the pandemic, attendance was near 200. The church is actively involved in planting and strengthening congregations all across Chile.

I have met periodically (virtually) with the elder selection committee over several months, and was blessed to attend the installation (also virtually) on Sunday, August 22, 2021.

Coincidentally, on that same day, the church was allowed to resume limited meetings in person after 18 months, with social distancing and masking required, with a maximum attendance of 30.

MISSION MINUTES

mission workers you would otherwise never know. Consider the impact when Christians know a specific missionary (excerpted from a Barna report).

Christians who know a missionary compared to those who do not know a missionary

20% more likely to give to mission work

20% more likely to pray for mission works

33% more likely to consider a short-term mission trip

150% more likely to consider long-term mission work
