God is at Work in our World!

I am continually amazed when I consider the many ways God is at work in our world among his people, advancing the Good News of Jesus, touching souls to bring them to salvation in Jesus. And I only get to see a small portion of God's world-wide work!

I see God at work in Bible institutes and preaching schools that are organized and maintained by local mission congregations with minimal outside assistance. What can you do? Will you pray daily for outreach and evangelism in Latin America? Will you pray for your brothers and sisters in Christ who are actively reaching out with the gospel? Will you pray for those Christians who have become discouraged during the restrictions imposed during the pandemic? Thank you!

Let me come to your church and introduce your members to missionaries and missionary efforts that are making a difference for the gospel. I love to tell the story!

MISSION GOALS FOR 2022

The end of the year is near, now less than two months away. In many churches, much of the mission planning for 2022 has already been done. But it is never too late to begin to make adjustments that will reap long-term and eternal results. Imagine how much the mission efforts in your church could be strengthened and enlarged with a few simple steps!

- Begin to develop a "mission culture" in the local church that focuses on <u>measurable results</u>, with clearly defined <u>expectations</u> that will guide future mission planning
- Manage the mission funding wisely, seeking to increase the mission outreach with the available funding
- Simplify the structure and systems needed to support a thriving mission effort
- Explore different mission models, discover what mission strategies are working, commit to doing those things that are most effective
- Develop plans that address the changing opportunities in missions after COVID-19
- Incorporate accountability into every mission effort
- Develop effective mission exit strategies that encourage mission maturity

I share two important questions about the future of mission work at your church.

First: Where do you want your church's global mission ministry to be in five years? Supporting more missionaries? Sharing the gospel with more people in more regions? Inspiring more congregational involvement in missions? Engaging in global missions in a smart and sustainable way for your church?

Second: Do you have a plan for clarifying that vision and making it a reality? If not, you are not alone. A recent Barna survey found that international mission is an area where many church leaders are looking for guidance.

(The goal-setting strategies mentioned above are those that are used for mission planning in Latin American Leadership Development.)

Mission Minute

What motivates mission involvement? According to Barna research, the top reason for involvement in a cause is the sense that one can make a difference. For a mission work to be "owned" by a congregation, the work must produce measurable results. The second reason for involvement: church leaders consistently cast a vision!

Church Planting in Cajamarca, Peru

Yexon and Bettzy have been in Cajamarca only since early 2021. The new church plant has grown to the point of needing

to rent a location. What a blessing it was to be able to say "yes" immediately when an appropriate location became available (picture right, picture below)! Thank you for your generosity.
