A personal note....

Jan and I are grateful to the many mission partners who have made 2023 a stellar year in the work of Latin American Leadership Development. By the end of 2023, I will have made five mission trips. (The number would be higher, but Jan and I avoided scheduling travel from February to May as we renewed our passports for another 10 years—until 2033! We had heard horror stories about the time was required to renew a passport. Fortunately, the process was easy and quick—we had our new passports in hand by late March.)

October: Another trip to the Dominican Republic

With the completion of the new church building at La Descubierta (picture, right), the Dominican brothers wanted to inaugurate the building with an evangelistic campaign. The original plan was that Jerry Keeley, elder at Fort Gibson, would accompany me but last-minute medical problems made it necessary for him to bow out. (Jerry plans to go on a future trip.)

A mission trip to the Dominican Republic begins with a very long travel day! Departing from Tulsa at 6:00 AM, it is possible to arrive in Santo Domingo by early afternoon. After immigration and customs, the overland trip to Neyba requires another 5-6 hours—longer than the air time!





The three days of the campaign were intense! The theme was "Now Is the Time!" The sermons were focused on Romans 1-6. Attendance was excellent. The presence of brothers and sisters from regional churches was an indication of the excitement generated by this giant step forward. On Saturday night, the activities had barely begun when the electricity went out! Multiple cell phone flashlights came

on almost immediately and the singing, praying, and preaching continued uninterrupted! The result was four responses for baptism and one response for prayers (*pictures next page*).



Dominicans like bright colors! The exterior accent color on the building was also used as the backdrop for the pulpit area. Christian Peguero, a denominational preacher from La Descubierta, made and donated the pulpit. He also constructed all the benches for the building! On Saturday, I was able to visit the project of Christian Relief Fund at the Vista al Lago church in Neyba. I

preached at Vista al Lago on Sunday morning. A new Haitian congregation has begun in Neyba, with the blessing that both groups can use the same location for worship and outreach.
