#### Introduction

## Annual Check-up

#### **Definitions:**

→Generous: unconditional sharing, James 1:1-5. God gives because of who he is, not because of who we are.

Alexander the Great: The story is told that one day a beggar by the roadside asked for alms from Alexander the Great as he passed by. The man was poor and wretched and had no claim upon the ruler, no right even to lift a solicitous hand. Yet the Emperor threw him several gold coins. A courtier was astonished at his generosity and commented, "Sir, coins would adequately meet a beggar's need. Why give him gold?"

Alexander responded in royal fashion, "Copper coins would suit the beggar's need, but gold coins suit Alexander's giving."

→Gracious: filled with grace, but we have missed the general meaning of grace, we have overspecialized it, made it a religious world, lost any context/meaning in the secular world. A person is gracious because they are giving.

## **Ten Foundational Truths**

#1--8:2, not a function of outward circumstances, or of wealth, is possible even in poverty **2** Out of the most severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity.

Three Levels of Giving

- 1. You have to (law)
- 2. You ought to (obligation)
- 3. You want to (grace)

#2--8:3, not a function of one's ability

3 For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, 4 they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints.

#3--8:4, is a ministry to others (9:1)

3 For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, 4 they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints.

#4--8:5, is easier when one first gives self

5 And they did not do as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord and then to us in keeping with God's will.

#5--8:6, is a grace, an act of kindness

6 So we urged Titus, since he had earlier made a beginning, to bring also to completion this act of grace on your part.

#6--8:8, reveals our genuine love

8 I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others.

#7--8:9, makes us like Christ

9 For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich.

#8--8:12, is what makes our gift acceptable

12 For if the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have.

#9--8:13, does not require that we give to the point of our suffering, God has enough for all 13 Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality.

#10--9:5, blesses others

5 So I thought it necessary to urge the brothers to visit you in advance and finish the arrangements for the generous gift you had promised. Then it will be ready as a generous gift, not as one grudgingly given.

The measure of a life, after all, is not its duration, but its donation.
